Generous Response for Cyclone Relief

Again you have responded with compassion and generosity to help the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee's relief work in Myanmar. The special offering on May 18, resulted in our being able to send UUSC \$1,200! Your gifts will help relieve the incredible suffering of the survivors. See page 10 for a summary of the UUSC's efforts.

UUSC's Response to Myanmar Cyclone

Two UUSC program staffpersons were in Myanmar just before the cyclone on program development work and are now in communication with contacts there to support vital relief efforts.

Because of the relationships formed in Myanmar and our existing partner relationships in southeast Asia, UUSC is now able to work with organizations on the ground delivering relief directly to affected groups. Since we returned from Myanmar and initiated the cyclone relief fund, we have undertaken the following:

- UUSC is supporting the relief efforts of a nongovernmental organization based in Myanmar with which we met during our recent visit. This group has many years experience in Myanmar & is leading health & relief missions into the storm-ravaged areas of the Irrawaddy delta by boat & dugout canoe in the areas of Panthein, Myaumura, & other affected areas through their staff and local partners. They are finding "complete destruction of many villages, people with severe diarrhea, extreme lack of potable water, lack of food, water contamination due to salt & decaying animal/human bodies and insecurity from looters. In Myaumura there are over 1,000 children without caregivers...teachers have taken on responsibility for orphans." This organization has recruited six teachers to organize kindergartens and care for the orphans. UUSC will be funding the care for unaccompanied children in the shelters in Myaumura, trauma counseling, medical treatment teams, and food and water distribution.
- UUSC has been in constant communication with one of our partners in India, the All India Disaster Mitigation Institute (AIDMI), which has done exemplary work with us in response to the Indian Ocean tsunami & the Pakistan earthquake. An AIDMI team has entered Myanmar & we're working with them on their aid proposal.
- UUSC is also in communication with international Buddhist relief organizations with a history of doing relief work and long-standing relationships with monasteries and nunneries in Myanmar. Monks and nuns in Myanmar are responding as people turn to them for help, and the aid that international Buddhist organizations provide goes through the monasteries. UUSC is in communication with one Buddhist organization that has already successfully sent relief in through the monasteries in Myanmar, to learn how we can best support their efforts.
- UUSC is consulting with a team of local relief and medical professionals to support their efforts to coordinate the aid response, particularly the response to survivors' medical needs. After an initial evaluation of the capacity of local and international agencies, this team will develop spaces and channels for communication and collaboration among these groups. This coordination will help ensure that aid reaches the largest number of affected communities and the groups of people most in need.

UUSC normally supports disaster relief efforts by working with local partner organizations to jointly assess unmet needs and identify particularly vulnerable populations that have been overlooked by mainstream aid strategies. This joint effort is usually undertaken following the immediate aftermath of the disaster event. However, because of the magnitude of the devastation in Myanmar and the current lack of an operational large-scale response, UUSC has decided to begin relief work in Myanmar immediately.

For this first phase of relief, we have already identified the organizations described above currently providing relief & able to serve as effective channels for additional resources, despite the freeze on official assistance. From our experience in disaster situations, we've learned that local organizations already working in affected regions are the best equipped to respond quickly & efficiently. UUSC is aware that in Myanmar, Buddhist monasteries & nunneries have historically served as places of refuge in times of need, & that people are flocking to them in search of aid.

Finally, even as UUSC begins to support immediate relief to the survivors of the cyclone in Myanmar, we are already thinking about the long term. We are discussing with our partners the mid- and long-term rebuilding and rehabilitation needs that the people of Myanmar will face. Together, and with your generous support, we will be able to act in solidarity with the courageous survivors of this devastating natural disaster.
