Greetings from Reverend Alicia

WHY Covenant?

Sure, jokes go around about how Unitarian Universalists can't arrive at consensus on much of anything, and certainly would never agree to be bound by anything that hinted of creed or dogma.

We do have our Principles and Purposes, which begin with the phrase "We, the member congregations of the Unitarian Universalist Association, Covenant to affirm and promote:" -- but this is something we do as a congregation.

Congregations are finding it useful to have an agreement in place among the members that simply and succinctly states how we covenant to engage with one another. This may seem unnecessary in a congregation like UUCiL -- a small and friendly church.

As your Interim Minister, I think it was good progress for the Board to adopt (about two months ago) a policy on how to handle disruptive behavior, should that ever be necessary. Without such a policy, your incoming Settled Minister would not know how to move with a troubling incidence of disruptive behavior. It may never be needed, but it is now in place to advise the minister and the board on what to do if problems arise. The next step is in adopting an agreement called "Covenant of Right Relations" that is accepted by the congregation. There will be opportunities for group discussion and input announced in the near future, but in the meantime, here is the statement as it stands, approved by the Board of Trustees at their recent meeting for submission to the congregation.

We covenant to build a religious community guided by respect and sustained by our principles. We want to listen appreciatively, speak with care, express gratitude, honor our differences and assume good intentions. We endeavor to communicate directly, honestly, and compassionately, particularly when we are in conflict. When we hurt one another, we will try to forgive, make amends, and reconnect in a spirit of right relationship. In celebration of the common purpose that unites us, we will do our best to abide by this covenant.

My experience has taught me that when the going gets difficult, it is good to be reminded of how we hope to rise to our best selves in the ways we relate to one another. I have seen heated Annual Meetings begin with a statement such as the one above. The result of hearing this prior to the general conversation has a calming, reflective effect. This might be read at the start of any committee meeting where it seems appropriate, or prior to an important vote on any topic which concerns the congregation. Also, the covenant might be printed now and then in the order of service, the newsletter and so on.

You may want to see some changes in what you find in the covenant as mentioned here. This is a suggestion, with appreciation for the work done in this area by the Unitarian Universalist Church in Kensington.

Watch for announcements about when we will gather to talk in depth about a Covenant of Right Relations, stay warm, and take care.

Sharing Stories While Building Movement: Small Group Ministry and the UU Voices for Health Care Campaign

A powerful metaphor for our troubled times: Do we live in a "YOYO" society or in a "WITT" society?

The "YOYO" or, "You're On Your Own" society emphasizes individualism, and warns against responsibility toward others. In the "YOYO" world, it's every person for themselves. The "YOYOs" place the burden of illness on the individual, and offer compassion only for a price. Meanwhile, the "WITT," or "We're In This Together" society, respects the interdependent web of all existence, and structures its community to reflect this. From libraries to public schools, from hospitals to homeless shelters, the "WITTs" believe they *all* benefit from these services, whether they personally need them or not. In the "WITT" world, ensuring community health is a responsibility shared by all.

UU Legislative Ministry's newest program fosters the "We're In It Together" approach, by offering small-group ministry as a key component of its UU Voices for Health Care Campaign. Trained facilitators will guide participants through theological reflection, personal sharing, and educational activities centered on the sensitive issue of health and healing. In the process, participants will develop the confidence and tools they need to faithfully advocate for health care reform.

Betty Jeanne Rueters-Ward, Lead Health Care Organizer for UULM, offers these reflections:

"The health care crisis in this nation has led me to despair more than once, both about the health of myself and my loved ones, and about the wellbeing of our society at large. Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., whose birthday we celebrate this week, said that 'of all forms of inequality, injustice in health care is the most shocking and inhumane.'

Each story I've heard from an uninsured or underinsured person causes me to doubt the very nature of humanity. How can it be that my country, with its enormous military spending, is the only industrialized nation that does not see health care as a basic human right?

I find hope in UULM's new Action Covenant on Health Care, a principled plan of action which calls for high-quality, universal health care, which is not only a moral imperative, but an achievable goal. This issue is so complex, so personal, so close to our hearts and our wallets, that we must approach it faithfully, and we must approach it together."

Jessica Rothhaar, an Organizer with Health Access California, shares her excitement for the campaign:

"In my experience, UU Legislative Ministry has been head and shoulders above the other denominations, not only in articulating statements of principle in support of universal health care, but also in thinking and organizing strategically to actually achieve social justice. UULM is on the ground doing the work to help congregations take action, develop leadership, and link with efforts in Sacramento to support positive public policy changes on behalf of health care reform."

UUCiL's Endowment Fund

In addition to supporting UUCiL as an active member or friend through contributions of time, talent, and money, individuals and families now have an opportunity to ensure that the religious mission and work of this congregation continues far into the future. This opportunity, which is a vital method to provide financial security for our Church, is by contributing to our Endowment Fund (Note, we already have a starting amount in the fund of \$28,012.59, and that the Church has already enacted a Bylaws amendment that established a policy and management structure for the UUCiL's Endowment Fund.)

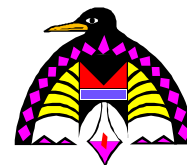
This year under the sponsorship of the Church Board and the Church Financial Committee, an acting Endowment Committee has been established. The committee is charged to launch an endowment fund campaign based on our Bylaws amendment. The acting committee (it is acting until the Church approves a sitting committee) is planning a series of informational meetings about our Endowment Fund. Two of these will be church-specific information sessions, and these will be followed by a workshop about estate planning and the mechanics of endowments. You will also be receiving a letter with more specifics, more detailed information in the February Newsletter, and information handouts at the Church Services.

For the church-specific information's sessions, we ask you to keep two dates in mind: Sunday, February 8 from 12 to 1:30 or Wednesday, February 11 from 7 to 8:30. Both will be held in the Tot Green room at the Church. At these meetings, we will discuss UUCiL's guidance for endowment, means and methods of giving and the UUA and UUCiL recommendations for guidance and management. Please plan to join us.

An endowment workshop is planned for later in February or early March. At that meeting we will have insurance and legal experts to answer questions about how you should manage your contributions. The committee will notify you when this workshop has been setup.

This is a message from the acting Endowment Committee - Chuck Hartwig, Arlen Rowe, & Lois Dueltgen. Feel free to ask any committee member questions about our endowment plan & policy.

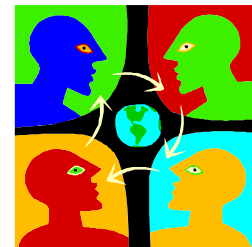
