Minister's Reflection

Susan Who???

You probably know Susan. She is an unassuming woman nearing her fifties who wouldn't appear to be anybody you would love to spend time with over a cup of tea or a meal. You might not even notice her if you saw her in the supermarket or in line at the bank. Or, you might size her up in one glance as "A plain, middle-aged woman . . . with bushy eyebrows and a dress and hairdo that might have been stylish when Dwight Eisenhower was president."¹

In other words, insignificant, invisible and irrelevant. Rather like you might feel when your hair starts to turn grey (if it hasn't already) and you are demoted from "Miss" or "Ms." to "Ma'am" and assumed to be incapable of imagining any sort of creative, brilliant or meaningful future. I mean, if you haven't done it by now, what are the odds?

If you thought you would someday appear on *American Idol*, that's a pity because after age 28 you are not eligible. Forget *The Amazing Race* – unless you have an athletic offspring or a younger spouse to help you through the tortuous, cut-throat competitions that must be completed. Okay, there may be a tortoise and a hare story now and then, when wisdom and experience outwitted pure physical stamina and drive. Watching the token "old woman" who is only fifty-something get the ax on *Survivor* following in the footsteps of just about every other "older" person on this reality show, must make anyone over forty wonder if they are a dinosaur.

A friend came to visit the other day & asked me what I thought of Susan. Susan who?

"How is it that you don't know about Susan Boyle?" "I don't know. Who is Susan Boyle?" I was immediately directed to a clip from the Internet on YouTube, while being admonished for allowing approximately five million others to gain awareness of Susan before I got a clue.

The clip featured Susan Boyle who is described above by one writer, & referred to as "frumpy" and other similar terms by others. But they don't stop there. They all go on to comment on a remarkable event that took place on *Britain's Got Talent*, when Susan came out on the stage, faced an audience of hundreds, and three judges – one known for his ease in making thoughtless, mean-spirited, sometimes shockingly mean, comments to hopeful contestants. The judges looked perplexed. Mr. Meanie looked annoyed about his time being wasted. The camera panned across the audience, revealing expressions of disdain and scorn.

Then the music for *I Dreamed A Dream* from the musical *Les Miserables* began and Susan Boyle began to sing. The judges were obviously stunned. After only a few notes, one looked like he was about to cry. Mr. Meanie looked perfectly amazed. The audience "rose as one in rapture at a voice that must have been forged in heaven."¹ The judges were on their feet, not judging but expressing their appreciation, their respect, their regret at having doubted the Susan Boyle that lived inside a body that, on a superficial level, was unremarkable. As the audience seated themselves for the remainder of the song, once again the camera panned the audience. Tears, vulnerable faces, kind expressions, smiles exchanged between friends and couples.

Once again, we were reminded of who we are, how we suffer, how we in turn cause pain &

how sometimes, just sometimes, we are redeemed from our fears. Hamlet was right when he held up the skull of the jester who once entertained him: “Go, tell your women to paint an inch thick, to this favor she must come.” It doesn’t matter if we have read *Hamlet* or not, we all know this fact, so when we experience being in the presence of true beauty, we are momentarily redeemed from a culture that has taught us that being older, out of fashion, full-figured, being who we truly are, devalues us. To escape this superficial overlay of our understanding, even for a brief time, is moving and inspirational. Surely, everyone in the audience, everyone watching Susan Boyle on YouTube, everyone who had the great & good privilege of hearing a voice forged in heaven, watched cynicism fall away as they experienced true, pure, mature beauty. This is what one of the 3 judges, Amanda Holden, expressed in her statement about how everyone present was cynical upon 1st glimpse of Susan, how everyone in the auditorium was against her & wondering why she thought she had the right to insert herself in a place she did not belong, but transformed the doubting, harsh, judging audience from cynicism into tear-soaked admiration & respect.

As your departing Interim Minister, if I could wish one thing for you, it would be that you see & feel the beauty that lives beneath the surface of yourself & others, appreciate it fully, & know that, regardless of your appearance, your financial status, your education, your big house on the south side of town, your age or anything else you can name – what really matters is the best of who you are on the inside – your gifts & your ability to offer them up to a culture that has been derailed by superficiality.

"CHALICE CAMP" (By Rev. Sheri Prud'homme & Laila Ibrahim)

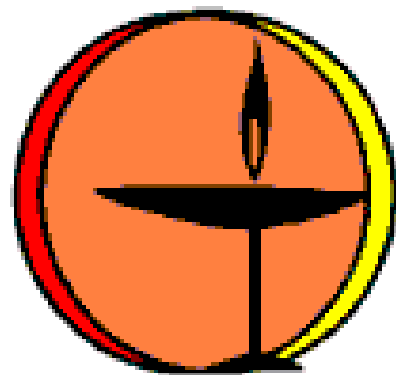

UUCiL Congregational Music Survey

In January of this year, the UUCiL Music Committee presented a congregational survey to obtain feedback regarding the church music program. The survey was answered by a total of 70 people. The members of the Music Committee spent a significant amount of time creating, revising, & finalizing the survey & would like to express their appreciation to all who took the time to send their responses. The information gleaned will be of great value to the Music Committee in its efforts to improve the church's music program.

From the questions regarding hymns, we learned that the hardback hymnal (*Singing the Living Tradition*) is enjoyed by 88% of people, while 66% agree that they also enjoy the supplemental hymnal (*Singing the Journey*). A slight majority of respondents (56%) like singing rounds, & 82% enjoy having occasional instrumental accompaniment along with the piano. Only 24% were in favor of having a song leader with a microphone, & only 36% like to learn new songs by rote. 54% of respondents are happy with 2 hymns per church service, while 43% would like to sing 3 hymns.

Regarding the choir & other vocal & instrumental ensembles or soloists, most agree that they enjoy hearing the adult choir (89%), but only 30% would have the choir perform more than twice per month. 82% & 78% of respondents enjoy hearing the youth choir and the chime choir, respectively. As for vocal & instrumental ensembles or soloists, 93% of respondents agree that they enjoy those musical offerings. About 55% of respondents prefer that the music & worship topic be related.

Most people (90%) agreed that UUCiL's services have about the right amount of music. All respondents agreed with the role of music to

“raise the mood & level of enjoyment” in the service, while 62% acknowledged hymn singing as an opportunity to take a break from sitting! Classical music won 94% of the votes for favorite type of music in church, with American Folk not far behind at 90%. Only 41% & 35% of respondents preferred Rock and Patriotic music, respectively. Regarding protocol at the beginning & the end of the worship service, 70% of respondents prefer to be seated & quiet for the Prelude, but only 37% want to do so during the Postlude.

When asked about the kinds of church-sponsored music activities they might enjoy attending or participating in outside of worship services, 45% were interested in Carol Singing and 40% liked the idea of Family Music Nights, but only a minority of respondents were interested in hymn singing sessions or vocal or instrumental ensembles. An “all music service” appealed to 52% of respondents, and a church-sponsored concert series or open microphone event was of interest to 57%.

87% of respondents agreed that music is an important part of their worship experience, and 80% agreed that we have an excellent music program at UUCiL. Some questions provided respondents with a chance to voice their opinion in their own words, providing the Music Committee with much valuable feedback. Each of these responses has been read & discussed by the Committee & will be taken into consideration as we strive to create a music program that enhances the worship experience at UUCiL. Any of us on the Committee would be happy to discuss the survey results with you further, if you wish. To those of you who responded, thank you again for your time & thoughtful input!
